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



#### THE MIKADO - THE STORY

#### **ACT ONE**

The scene is set in the courtyard of the Lord High Executioner's palace in the suburban town of Titipu. A strolling minstrel by the name of Nanki-Poo arrives enquiring as to the whereabout's of Yum-Yum, a young girl with whom he has fallen in love. Yum-Yum is the ward of Ko-Ko, a cheap tailor in the town and Nanki-Poo has heard that he has recently been condemned to death for flirting. He is hoping that he will be able to further his relationship.

Unbeknown to the residents, Nanki-Poo is really the son of the Mikado, the Emperor of Japan and has fled the royal court to avoid the attentions of Katisha an elderly, unattractive lady to whom he has become betrothed.

In the meantime, Ko-Ko's sentence has been commuted and he has been let out on bail on the basis that he becomes Lord High Executioner - a clever ruse on the part of the citizens of Titipu to circumvent the Mikado's law on flirting: an executioner under sentence of death would be duty bound not to execute anyone else until he had cut off his own head!

Pish Tush informs Nanki-Poo of Ko-Ko's new appointment and Pooh-Bah, a particularly haughty and exclusive person tells him that Yum-Yum is to be married to Ko-Ko this very day on her return from school. Pooh Bah's inflated opinion has been boosted by his acceptance of all the posts of the great officers of state who had all resigned in protest at the elevation of a cheap tailor.

Yum-Yum arrives with her friends Pitti-Sing and Peep-Bo and once again meets Nanki-Pooh. Ko-Ko, seeing the obvious attraction has Nanki-Poo removed. Later the pair are alone and Nanki-Poo reveals his true identity, but as Yum-Yum is already betrothed she has no option but to reject his advances.

Ko-Ko receives a letter from the Mikado who has noted the distinct lack of executions in the town. Failure to produce a satisfactory result would cause dire consequences for the whole town and it is obvious that someone's head must roll. Pooh Bah and Pish Tush have no doubts that Ko-Ko is the obvious candidate but, not un-naturally, Ko-Ko objects and sets out to find a substitute.

By chance, he comes upon the distraught Nanki-Poo who has decided that life without Yum-Yum is worthless - his only course of action is suicide. Ko-Ko is delighted - here is the substitute but Nanki-Poo insists that, if he is to be executed, he must marry Yum-Yum and live with her for a month prior to his final demise. Reluctantly, Ko-Ko agrees and withdraws from the celebrations which are interrupted by the arrival of the aforementioned Katisha who has sought out her beloved Nanki-Poo. Her attempts to retrieve her love are thwarted by the crowd who refuse to allow her to reveal his true identity.

#### **ACT TWO**

In Ko-Ko's garden, Yum-Yum prepares for her wedding. Her concern for her impending widowhood are increased with Ko-Ko's relevation that the wife of a beheaded man is buried alive on his death. Nanki-Poo agrees to release her from this terrible fate and, as his reason for life has once again disappeared, asks Ko-Ko to execute him immediately. Ko-Ko, who has never hurt a blue bottle cannot bring himself to carry out the deed, but the imminent arrival of the Mikado brings matters to a head!! What can be done to save the situation?

Ko-Ko comes up with the idea that a signed declaration stating that an execution had taken place would be sufficient to convince the Mikado and Pooh-Bah, ever open to corruption, certifies the death of Nanki-Poo who promptly leaves to marry Yum-Yum.

The Mikado and his retinue arrive with the dreaded Katisha and are impressed to hear that an execution has taken place. The effecting particulars of the scene are graphically explained by Ko-Ko, Pitti-Sing and Pooh-Bah. Katisha then realises, in horror, that the victim of the executioner's sword was no other than her own Nanki-Poo. The Mikado isn't a bit angry - after all, how were they to know they were executing the heir to the throne? However, in doing so, they would have to be put to death but their fate is postponed until after lunch.

Oh dear, Nanki-Poo must come back to life, but in doing so, Katisha would be bound to demand his execution for breach of their marriage contract. Ko-Ko is told that to save the day, he must woo and wed Katisha himself, thus withdrawing her claim on the resurrected Nanki-Poo. Reluctantly, he agrees to persuade the fearsome lady to become his bride after which, all is revealed.

The Mikado finds that "nothing could be more satisfactory" and the wedding celebrations continue with excitement and happiness for everyone.



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#### THE MIKADO - HISTORICAL NOTES

The Mikado has most certainly been performed more than any other Gilbert & Sullivan production. The initial run, at the Savoy Theatre, was 672 performances lasting for almost two years.

It was written after a very difficult period in their relationship. By the late spring of 1884, audiences for 'Princess Ida' were decreasing. Richard D'Oyly Carte was keen that a new opera would invigorate his company but Sullivan rejected ideas brought forward by Gilbert. He was becoming more than a little annoyed with the 'ridiculous plots' and demanded a more straight-forward libretto where the music could stand as the equal of the words. Gilbert took offence to this attitude and it seemed that the partnership was doomed to failure.

In May 1884, Gilbert had recently moved to a new house in Harrington Gardens, Kensington. Whilst pacing the floor of his study, possibly seeking the inspiration for a workable plot, a large Japanese executioner's sword fell from its mounting on the wall and landed with a resounding crash on the floor. It is reputed that from this - the idea for the Mikado was born.

Fashion in England in the 1880's was very much influenced by all things Japanese - fabrics, ceramics, prints, furniture and a whole array of oriental goods were eagerly demanded by the public. What could be better for the plot of a new opera than for it to be set in Japan - its success was almost guaranteed.

The Mikado has stood the test of time and the many changes in fashion. It has had several 'incarnations' including 'A Swing Mikado' in 1938 and 'The Black Mikado' in 1975. It was also the first Savoy Opera to find its way onto celluloid in 1939. There can be few people in the English speaking world who would be unable to recognise 'Three Little Maids from School', indeed, who can forget a performance of that particular item by three naval officers on board the 'Ark Royal' in the BBC TV documentary 'Sailor' in the 1970's.

The Mikado has a place in our hearts - long may it continue to do so.
