



Hidden in a cove overlooking the sea, a band of pirates sing a drinking song to mark the completion of twenty one year old Frederic's apprenticeship. Welcomed now as a full member of the band, Frederic informs the Pirate King that though he loves them all individually, as a group he abhors their deeds. Through an error, made by his dearly loved, but ageing nurse Ruth, he was apprenticed to a pirate instead of to a pilot and he announces his intention to leave the band and devote his time to their extermination. Frederic, who has been constantly at sea since the age of seven has only seen one woman, Ruth, whom he believes is a beautiful creature. Laughing as they depart, the Pirates assure Frederic that he and Ruth will be an excellent match. About to pledge his troth, Frederic is interrupted by the voices of young girls. On closer investigation, he sees that Ruth has played upon his innocence. Quickly banishing Ruth, he hides to observe the group of hardy little lasses tripping gaily into the cove. Overwhelmed by their beauty, Frederic reveals himself as a Pirate. In pseudo terror, the girls, (all sisters), reluctantly reject his advances. He is almost desperate, when suddenly the scene is interrupted by Mabel who immediately accepts his proposal and they fall instantly in love. Frederic suddenly remembers that the Pirates are lurking in the area and the girls prepare to leave. Too late, the Pirate King and his band, descend upon the cove, fully intending to carry off these maidens and wed them all. Enter the girls father, who happens to be a Major-General. Appalled at the prospect of loosing his remarkably large family, he quickly invents a tall story. Having previously heard that the Pirates make a point of never attacking an orphan, he declares himself to be one. The Pirates respect his claim and prepare to take their leave. Frederic fully intending to stay with Mabel, is once more confronted by Ruth, who in a final attempt to win his heart, throws herself at his feet. Tired of her attentions, he dismisses her with the help of his former comrades. The Act closes with the the Major-General and his family being made honorary members of the Pirate band.

Act II opens in a ruined Chapel on the cliffs above the cove. The Major-General, surrounded by his daughters for comfort, hides among the tombs of his ancestors. Fearing that the Pirates will discover his ruse, he humbles himself before his ancestors in the Chapel. The gallant Frederic has engaged the services of the local constabulary to hunt down the Pirates. Led by their Sergeant, the Police make their appearance announcing the plans to protect the family. When next alone, Frederic is surprised by the appearance of the Pirate King and Ruth who have discovered a paradox. Frederic, it appears, was apprenticed until his 21st birthday, and as he was born in leap year that birthday would not be reached by him till 1940. Appealing to his sense of duty he, reluctantly re joins the band, managing to explain the situation to Mabel before he leaves. The Pirates attack and the Police who are hiding in waiting are quickly defeated. Fearing they are doomed the Major-General and the girls are saved by the intervention of Ruth. She explains that the Pirates are really Peers, noblemen who have gone wrong. This instantly alters the situation and everyone forgives everyone else. Pirate-noblemen and daughters are united with the full blessing of the Major-General in a somewhat contrived finale.
