





ACT I An Arcadian Landscape

An Arcadian landscape is the backdrop for a youthful band of singing and dancing fairies lamenting the banishment twenty five years previously of the most admired member of the group - Iolanthe. Seizing an opportunity, the fairies plead with their Queen for her pardon. Iolanthe is summoned and after brief rituals, is reinstated as a member of the troop. She explains she has a son Strephon, who is half a fairy, and a shepherd, betrothed to the shepherdess, Phyllis. Strephon appears and is introduced to his mother's immortal sisters, whom, like his mother have not aged a day in centuries! As the fairies prepare to move on, the Queen grants Strephon the troop's special protection. Strephon is joined by his love, Phyllis and although she is a ward in Chancery, they vow to marry at once. Trumpet fanfares herald the arrival of the entire House of Peers from Westminster. All are in love with Phyllis, and have appealed to the Lord Chancellor to give this humble person to which ever Lord she chooses to select. Unashamed of her lowly origins Phyllis refuses their offers and Strephon comes to her rescue. The couple are parted and Iolanthe attempts to comfort him. Unobserved, the Peers bring Phyllis to witness the scene. Convinced he has betrayed her, she confronts him. Strephon insists the lady is his mother. Distraught, Phyllis offers herself to one of the two richest lords. Strephon, summons the fairies, who back his story. In a series of blunders the Lord Chancellor insults the Queen and her band. In wrath, she casts her punishment and Strephon becomes a Member of Parliament.

ACT II The Palace Yard, Westminster

In the palace yard at Westminster, the philosophical Private Willis, is on sentry duty. The fairies and peers enter and tell of the mischief Strephon has caused since his entry to Parliament. Sensing their attraction for the Peers, the Queen scolds the fairies and reminds them of the consequences should they marry a mortal. Phyllis, engaged to two pompous noblemen laments her situation. Unable to select either of the two, she begs them not to end their boyhood friendship and to release her.

The Lord Chancellor, also attracted to Phyllis, wrestles with his conscience.

Unhappy, Phyllis and Strephon meet by chance. Telling Phyllis of his fairyhood origins, she at once sees his case and they make up. As Phyllis is still a ward in chancery they ask Iolanthe to use her fairy charm to persuade the Chancellor to allow them to marry. Iolanthe admits that the Lord Chancellor is her husband whom she has not seen for twenty five years. Hiding behind her veil, she pleads their case with the Chancellor. Telling her that he is now engaged to Phyllis, Iolanthe once more breaks her vows. As she prepares to die, the fairies confess that they too have broken their vows and are betrothed to the Peers. The Oueen unable to dispose of the entire company accepts the suggestion that "every fairy will die who don't marry a mortal." Private Willis is summoned to save the life of the Queen. As the Parliamentary House is now composed of intellectuals, the Peers are of no use and join the ranks of immortality.
